War Official Outlines Six-Point Program For Army

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The president has outlined a six-point program for the army which will be presented to the next Congress.

The program includes: 1. A 10 percent increase in the number of army officers. 2. A 10 percent increase in the number of army enlisted men. 3. A 10 percent increase in the number of army aircraft. 4. A 10 percent increase in the number of army tanks. 5. A 10 percent increase in the number of army trucks. 6. A 10 percent increase in the number of army jeeps.
