STEPPING UP OF STEELMAKING IS SEEN IN DISTRICT

Indications Seen Two More
Open Hearth Furnaces
Will Start Soon

Birmingham district's steelmaking rate of 68 per cent is scheduled for early upward revision by probable addition of two open hearth furnaces.

This was learned Saturday from unofficial but posted sources and more than likely is accounted for by the fact that shipments thus far this month have been considerably in excess of last month and because of scheduled reopening Dec. 1 of the Ensley rail mill.

Authentic information is that steel interests in the immediate district are distinctly encouraged, not only because of developments thus far, but by virtue of the fact that prospects for continued production on a relatively high scale are distinctly bright.

Nor is the district left to mere speculation as a basis for optimism. In addition to the fact that production already is on a highly gratifying scale and that employment continues to mount from week to week, action of the major industries in continually stepping up output of raw materials is ample proof of mounting production of finished products.

An example of this was evident again last week with announcement that the Tennessee company will recall another 400 coal miners at Edgewater next Wednesday.

Inquiry Saturday revealed highly satisfactory output of sheets (which are at capacity), plates, shapes and wire products, in addition to some lesser items in steel.

Production of pig iron chows no immediate signs of recession, with 16 of the district's total of 18 blast furnaces in operation.

The nearer the holidays approach, the more evident it becomes that there will be a wide distribution of payrolls throughout the industrial district.

If demand holds approximately at its present level, the district will have sufficient momentum to carry it well into next year, as far as major operations are concerned.

"It is necessary, very beloved children, to do what we can and what is in our power to react against these powers of evil."

from public entertainments and fined them \$400,000,000 for the slaying of a German diplomat by a young Polish-German Jew in Paris.

In London amid widespread condemnation of the Nazi campaign, came evidence from one of Chamberlain's own ministers that it had shaken the faith of at least part of his cabinet in his efforts to obtain a lasting friendship with Chancellor Hitler.

Addressing a regional meeting of the National Labor Council Saturday, Earl De La Warr, in the cabinet as president of the board of education, said that instead of encouraging hopes for appeasement, "events on the continent during the last few days have served to add certainty to the conviction that we live in a world in which those who desire to defend the decencies of life must be strong both in arms and in moral purpose."

De La Warr asserted Britain faced the possibility of a fight "for her very existence," and that "that struggle may be resolved in terms of diplomacy or in terms of war."

Nazi Germany also required Jews whose 1,000 Berlin shops were wrecked or looted Thursday in mass demonstrations must pay for the damage themselves.

Hundreds of fleeing Jews were turned back at the French frontier Saturday night.

Authorities said many refugees must have succeeded in getting into France by crossing the frontier along unguarded stretches.

Many of the Jews said they had been encouraged by Nazis to "escape" into France.

Police made wholesale arrests among Jewish moneyed, educated and cultured classes, 1,600 being taken into custody in Berlin alone. In Vienna it was estimated that between 18,000 and 20,000 Jews had been arrested since Thursday.

While the anti-Semitic campaign was intensified, there were new manifestations against Catholics. Aroused Nazis at Munich shattered many windows in the palace of Michael Cardinal von Faulhaber.

REARMAMENT IS PUSHED AS NAZIS BEAT DOWN JEWS

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1. Prohibited Jews from conducting retail businesses, mail order and commission houses and independent handicraft enterprises after Jan. 1.

2. Barred Jews from heading any industrial or commercial concern.

3. Ordered Jews excluded from theaters, movie houses, concerts and other public presentations.

Arrests and isolation of Jews were reported in Berlin, Salzburg, Frankfurt-on-Main, Munich, Vienna, Nuernberg, Dresden and a number of other cities. Nearly all male Jews were said to have been arrested in some smaller towns.

In Berlin's boroughs of Charlottenburg, Schoenberg and Wilmersdorf, where better class Jews live, it was indicated that police sought all males. Many were seized and taken to concentration camps.

In the attack on Cardinal von Faulhaber's palace at Munich, a crowd broke between 60 and 70 panes on the ground floor after the cardinal had sought police protection.

Previous anti-Semitic measures have shut the doors of schools and universities, prohibited Jews from mingling with non-Jews, barred them from health resorts, and banned, at least temporarily, Jewish newspapers, magazines and scientific publications.

There was no official indication of what was to be done with Jews who had been arrested.

The Jewish Sabbath, Saturday, was hiding out day for hundreds of prominent Jews.

Not daring to go home lest they be arrested, they took refuge where they could, hoping that the raids soon would end.

As a companion piece to the anti-Semitic demonstrations an editorial broadside in the controlled German press assailed the British for their actions in Palestine.

In Washington, Senator King (D., Utah) suggested the United States sever diplomatic relations with Germany as a result of the latest anti-Jewish measures adopted by the Reich.

Several other senators also expressed indignation privately at the latest anti-Semitic pronouncements in Germany.

Heavy fighting was said to be continuing Saturday night in the Northeastern corner of Hunan province where Japanese told of occupying Yochow and Chinese reported successful defense thus far of the gateway city.

Thousands of Chinese civilians were reported in flight from the Japanese campaign fanning out from Hankow, 122 miles down the Yangtze from Yochow.

Meanwhile, the Spanish insurgents said their forces were moving down from the Chercun Mountains in an attempt to cut the last road connecting government advance positions with bases on the opposite, or left shore of the Ebro River.
